## **NCKMC Highlight**

NAST-NCKMC successfully conducted a Policy Dialogue on Climate Change and Consultation and Mobile Library for Climate Change Awareness in the eastern region of the country. The Policy Dialogue and Consultation was conducted in Biratnagar, Nepal's industrial hub in eastern lowland Tarai. Professor Maheswor Man Shrestha, Vice Chancellor of Purbanchal University had inaugurated the program amidst a hall full of over 100 enthusiastic participants who represented government line agencies, research and educational institutions, political parties, local and non government organizations, youth volunteers and mass media. The Mobile Library was organized at Bhanu HSS, Fungling Bazar, Taplejung, Srijung HSS, Gopetar, Panchthar, Adarsha HSS at Ilam Bazar, Ilam and Shree Janta HSS, Triyuga, Udayapur. The program attracted hundreds of enthusiastic high school students as they knew it was important for them to understand about the much-talked topic but less told. Teachers, principals and members of school management committee also observed the program. A dozen of colorful posters in simple Nepali language with photos or graphics explaining about climate change and its impacts on human health, agriculture, forests, biodiversity and livelihood were displayed at the premises of the schools.

## **Climate change laid scientists' dismal**

The rate of rising temperature at Himalayan region drew scientists' attention abiding the foreseen negative impacts of climate change. The fast melting of glaciers led the variation in shape and size of glacial lake and about 67% of changes has already been seen said the team leader of Nepal Climate Change Knowledge Management Center, Dr Dinesh Raj Bhujju. Climate change experts opined the impacts had felt in many sectors and the scenario of intense rainfall, scanty rainfall, and long monsoon rainfall pattern observed were due to climate change.

## **Policies failed to prioritize gender issue**

Although, women play a more central role in building their communities' climate resilience, they were neglected in every aspect. Even the policy framework Local Adaptation Plans of Action (LAPA), the existing policies and strategies such as National Adaptation Programme of Action (NAPA) and Climate Change Policy 2011, though, designed to help the vulnerable communities; lack mainstreaming gender issues while developing strategies to combat climate change. Therefore, seeing the urgency to incorporate gender issue, IUCN in coordination with the MoE is developing Gender in Climate Change Strategy for Nepal.
